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Building plan worries village

DISTURBED Thorncombe villagers met on Friday to probe an ambitious development scheme on land owned by a high-ranking planning official.

At the 90-strong emergency meeting, the villagers voted to ask the district council to postpone its decision until it-knows more about the scheme.

The land, backing on to gardens of the beauty spot village, is owned by Thorncombe parish councillor and

Western Area planning subcommittee vice-chair Mr Percy Atyeo.

The development due to come before the subcommittee on Thurs day, included the building of 25 homes, a farmhouse, light industrial units and a holiday complex.

Residents attending the meeting felt the proposed development would prove detrimental to the scale, ter and way of life village.

Thorncombe was also in a designated area of outstanding natural beauty.

District council chief executive Mr Michael Taylor said it was possible that no decision would be made on Thursday and that the application might have to go before the district council's development and planning committee.

Added Mr Taylor: "Col Gibson should be allowed to speak at the meeting and to represent local people. Whatever happens will depend on the day itself and on the decision of the chairman."

Commented Mr Atyeo on being told about the emergency meeting in the village: "I appreciate their feelings, but this is a family matter which does not rest entirely with me.

"I declared an interest, which was why I was not at the meeting. There is no way in which I can participate in any decisions, and I am unable to comment further."
